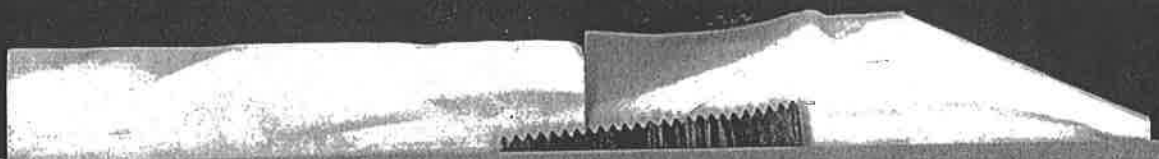

Spelling-Meaning Strategy

The Latin Root *reg*

You have learned that the words *regimen* and *regiment* are often confused because they have similar spellings, pronunciations, and meanings. One of the reasons for this is that both words contain the Latin root *reg*, meaning “guide, rule, or law.” A *regimen* is a set of rules you follow. *Regiment* was originally used to describe a government but now describes a military unit. Both a government and a military unit follow strict sets of rules.
