NAMES/ NOMBRES by Julia Alvarez

Setting: 1960's New York City (Julia lived in New York City but she lived in the Dominican Republic until she was ten.)

Questions

- 1.) A.)How would YOU feel when your name is mispronounced. B.) Are you proud of your name? C.) Would you change your name if possible?
- 2.) **Theme** (page 6:3) Julia's teachers and friends mispronounce her name, and Julia wonders if she should correct them. What point is Alvarez trying to make about her identity?
- 3.) **Inferring** (page 6:3): What do you think Julia's mom means when she says, "a rose by any other name would smell as sweet."
- 4.) **Theme** (page 6:4): Alvarez creates and alternative identity for herself. What connection is Alvarez making about the connection between one's name and one's identity?
- 5.) Evaluate: Discuss why Julia Alvarez put American beauty in quotation marks. Was it appropriate to do so?
- 6.) **Critical Thinking:** What does the author mean by the phrase..."not yet in."
- 7.) **Literary Elements Plot**-Internal conflict: Discuss why Julia tells others she is from New York, even though she mostly lived in the Dominican Republic.



8.) **Critical Viewing**: The Musicians, 1979 Fernando Botero. Oil on canvas. Private collection.

Fernando Botero is a contemporary artist from Columbia. He often paints cheerful, ballon-shaped, not quite true-to-life people. Which scene from the story would you like to see painted in the style of Botero. Explain.

- 9.) **Evaluate:** Identify the proper spelling Puerto Rico. Why do you think the author gives this spelling considering the pronunciations are the same?
- 10.) **Literary Elements Theme**: What is the connection between the story's title and theme in this passage?
